Tried: 15 September 1825, London

Ticket of Leave: 29 October 1836

Trade: servant of all work, prostitute

Sentence: 14 years

Offence: stealing 11/6 from the person

Free Certificate: 15 September 1839

Whilst a Convict

- ❖ Ship's surgeon Matthew Burnside wrote:
She is a notorious strumpet and a most dangerous girl. The trouble which she gave me is unaccountable. Repeatedly I have been obliged to put her into irons and confined her in the Coal-Hold.
(Philip Tardif named his well-known book after her.)
- ❖ 24 offences listed, mostly for being drunk and disorderly or absent without leave.
- ❖ Spent time at the female factories in Hobart and George Town.
- ❖ Whilst at George Town Female Factory, Julia was charged with riotous and disorderly conduct in the sleeping rooms of the ward and making use of violent and infamous language.

- ❖ Married Peter HILL (per *Andromeda I*) 23 November 1848 at Longford.
